To the Board of Directors, Saskatoon City Hospital Foundation Inc.

The accompanying summarized financial statements, which comprise the summarized statement of financial position as at **March 31**, **2021** and the summarized statement of revenues and expenses and changes in fund balances for the year then ended are derived from the audited financial statements of Saskatoon City Hospital Foundation Inc. for the year ended March 31, 2021. We expressed an audit opinion on those financial statements, modified for the completeness of donations, in common with many not-for-profit organizations, in our report dated June 16, 2021.

The summarized financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required by Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. Reading the summarized financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial statements of Saskatoon City Hospital Foundation Inc.

Management's Responsibility for the Summarized Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of a summary of the audited financial statements on the basis described in Note 1.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the summarized financial statements based on our procedures, which were conducted in accordance with Canadian Auditing Standards (CAS) 810, "Engagements to report on summary financial statements".

Saskatoon City Hospital Foundation Inc. Note to the Summarized Financial Statements For the year ended March 31, 2021 (with comparative figures for the year ended March 31, 2020)

1. Applied criteria

The summarized financial statements are derived from the audited financial statements, prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, as at March 31, 2021 and March 31, 2020 and for the years then ended.

The preparation of these summarized financial statements requires management to determine the information that needs to be reflected in them so that they are consistent in all material respects with, or represent a fair summary of, the audited financial statements.

Management prepared these summarized financial statements using the following criteria:

(a) the summarized financial statements include a statement for each statement included in the audited financial statements except for the statement of cash flows, as it is deemed less relevant for the users of the summarized financial statements;

(b) information in the summarized financial statements agrees with the related information in the audited financial statements;

(c) major subtotals, totals and comparative information from the audited financial statements are included; and
(d) the summarized financial statements contain the information from the audited financial statements dealing with matters having a pervasive or otherwise significant effect on the summarized financial statements.

sponsors and virtual or real attendees also was more than could have been imagined.



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Campaign almost complete two years later

Thank you for making the O.R. your priORity, too!

Launched in February, 2020, Making the O.R. a Pri<u>OR</u>ity was a \$3.7 million campaign to replace equipment and upgrade services in Saskatoon City Hospital's Operating Room.

With 12 operating theatres, it's a busy place that handles almost 13,000 procedures every year. Gynecology, orthopedics, ophthalmology, cystoscopy, urology, and cancerrelated surgeries are just some of the procedures that take place. "Many of the pieces we identified had reached the end of their working life," says Terri Nixey, who was the O.R.'s manager at the time the campaign began. "The equipment was at the point where it was no longer serviceable and wasn't supported by the manufacturers. Replacement was the only option and was crucial to keep up with the number of surgeries."

The pieces identified included a new ophthalmologic microscope for eye surgeries, anesthetic equipment, video towers, steam sterilizers in the hospital's Medical Device Reprocessing department, and an overhaul of the O.R.'s cystoscopy room.

This latter piece attracted a major donation even before the campaign officially began. Longtime friends of the hospital and healthcare in the community, Irene and Leslie Dubé, kick-started the program with a one million dollar gift. The couple were especially interested in funding the cystoscopy suite.

"It matched with support we'd given to urology medicine in other hospitals," Les Dubé told the Foundation at the time, noting the Leslie and Irene Dubé Urology Centre of Health at St. Paul's Hospital. "And it matched our philosophy. We believe we've been well rewarded in our lives and that we have a responsibility wherever we see a need to do something to help others."

Many of those being helped are the thousands of patients who pass through City Hospital's Operating Room. Others are the medical professionals in the O.R. who know that having the best equipment will result in optimal recoveries for those patients.

As the O.R.'s equipment resource technician, Sanja Jovic-Filipovic oversees equipment in all 12 of its operating theatres. Previously, she worked as an O.R. nurse for 10 years, stationed mainly in the cystoscopy suite. She was thrilled to learn it was being updated.

"I don't think there's anybody happier in this hospital with the improvements than me," Jovic-Filipovic says,

adding the entire staff welcomed pieces to the suite, including a new procedure bed and a fluoroscopy machine. "The old bed just wasn't ergonomic and our backs were always sore after a procedure – and the patients were uncomfortable, too.

"The old fluoroscopy unit was finicky and wouldn't always capture the images we needed. The whole room itself was cramped because the equipment was so large. It was like an obstacle course and everyone was bumping into things."

Jovic-Filipovic was thrilled to be in the new room for training in late September. She's also thankful to donors for other equipment that O.R. staff is now using. "With new technology and improvements, there's more fluidity in the whole process. Everything is so automatically optimized; you just press a button and it saves five minutes of preparations. The images are clearer, the tasks easier.

"Having well-functioning equipment just makes everyone feel better and work happier. That translates to patients, which is what it's all about. They're already stressed and anxious so anything we can do to make it better for them is great and that includes new equipment."

Her joy at working with new equipment echoes through the hospital, literally. Scott Zablocki, manager of the hospital's Medical Device Reprocessing department, which cleans and sterilizes thousands of medical tools every day, tells a happy tale.

"We told the staff just before Christmas last year that the new cart, utensil washer, and two new steam sterilizers we'd requested were being ordered, thanks to Foundation donors. Everyone was clapping, jumping up and down and cheering. The staff truly felt like they'd just received a giant Christmas present."
