1. Applied criteria

THESE ARE THE PEOPLE YOU HELP

Two executive directors. A radio deejay. A retired police officer.

The people in your neighbourhood? Yes, but they're also people who were helped because you supported Saskatoon City Hospital Foundation. You ensured that staff had the best, latest and safest equipment.

Your efforts helped retired police officer Aime Decae.
Both of his knees were replaced at Saskatoon City Hospital.

It was after the second replacement that he had an accident at home. "I was doing physical therapy and slipped and fell while going up stairs. But it was the best thing that ever happened in my life!"

That's because, while Aime bruised his knee in the fall, later that same day he noticed blood in his urine. He thought he'd pulled a groin muscle so went to see his doctor. That led to an ultrasound and then referral to a urologist at the hospital for cystoscopy, which found cancer in his bladder.

Aime underwent two operations to remove the tumours, which were determined to be high-grade and invasive. He's since been coming to Saskatoon City Hospital for Bacillus Calmette-

Guerin (BCG) treatments, a tuberculosis vaccine that kills cancer.

On the road to recovery, Aime says, "I can't speak well enough about the health system, the care is simply outstanding."

Saskatoon Club executive director Sarah Buettner is also grateful for care received at Saskatoon City Hospital. The young mother of two wasn't feeling well this

past Easter and instantly recognized her symptoms as a flare-up of Behcet's disease. Behcet's is a rare disorder that causes blood vessel inflammation throughout the body. In Buettner's case, discovered seven years ago, it causes her white blood cells to attack each other.

"I was having chest pains and knew something was wrong. Because I live just across the street from City Hospital, I went to emergency and told them about the chest pain and autoimmune disease. They told me to have a seat but I don't think I even made it to a chair before a nurse came and told me to go with her."

She says the care and compassion from staff was superb, with staff immediately understanding her symptoms and using their skills to treat it.

Buettner spent the day in emergency before being transferred later to RUH, where she recovered after a week. "But the City staff was so amazing. The nurses just hung out with me. I remember cracking jokes all the time and them laughing. It was just a really good, special experience."

Keith Moen, executive director of the North Saskatoon Business Association (NSBA), says Saskatoon City Hospital saved his eyesight.

He was at Prairieland Park setting up for the NSBA's annual business awards ceremony when he noticed, "this floater in my eyes that I'd had for a while was moving in differently. My optometrist told me it was something I should watch for."

Keith texted his optometrist who told him to go to his office right away. While the optometrist ran tests, Keith's vision worsened. "He immediately sent me to the Eye Care Centre at City Hospital. By the time I left his office, I was blind in my left eye."

"Keith's case was age-related change," surgeon Dr. Masri says. "The gel in the back of the eye shifts and sometimes, becomes sticky, tearing hole in the retina.

Dr. Masri saw that Keith's eye was hemorrhaging so immediate surgery was needed.

His vision saved, Keith says, "I'm so thankful that the equipment and expertise is there. I never had any doubt that I was in the right place with the right people at Saskatoon City Hospital."

Putting your life in the hands of health care is one thing but Rock102 deejay Whitney Graves was so confident, she put the lives of her two children in their caring hands.

About eight years ago, Whitney chose to have a home birth through the midwifery program that operates out of Saskatoon City Hospital.

She raves about the program. "The midwives and everyone involved were so warm, educated and thoughtful. Any time I had a question, they gave me the facts without pushing me anywhere. I felt empowered and supported."

Whitney grew fonder of her midwife, Alison, during her 26-hour labour. "She made me as comfortable as possible and there was even a point where she thought I might need to go the hospital to be induced."

But, thanks to the midwife's care, Whitney had a successful birth. "The aftercare also was tremendous. They came to my house for the first few weeks to check on us. Alison went above and beyond because I was struggling with being a new mom and breastfeeding. She helped me decide my next steps."

The experience was so great that, Whitney returned to the program for her second delivery. That experience was much smoother, she says. "I went into labour and my body knew what to do. It was a beautiful experience and smooth sailing because of the great care."


