Growing up in a trades family my dad always taught me to help others when they ask for help. So, I've always been that guy who loved fixing things and helping our friends and family. Sherri and I are both very passionate and dedicated to helping and volunteering in our community when we can. It feels so good to put your time and energy into volunteering together with

other great people to build the strongest possible community. Saskatoon is a big small town and the community really stands behind making it the best place to be, we couldn't be more proud to be part of it.

And City Hospital is close to our heart because it saved my life. When I was 25 years old, I had a blood clot in my leg after a work accident. I got very sick, very suddenly, and the next thing I knew I was in a high-speed ambulance to City Hospital. I received 24-hour care for 2 days and the whole experience was amazing.

This Hospital is second to none. Our staff are fantastic, our facilities are clean, bright and beautiful. As a volunteer, and now Board Chair, it makes me very proud to hear people share stories and rave about the care they and their loved ones get here.

Sherri and I maintain insurance premiums on a policy that we've donated to City Hospital Foundation, and indicated that we want our gifts now—and in the future—to be used where it is most needed. It was my husband's wish that the lectures carry on: he believed, as I do, that medical advances were proceeding so quickly, and we were very impressed with the learning. It feels good to know that our ophthalmologists will learn new techniques and build relationships. When he was a soldier, my father stepped on a land mine and was critically injured. It was a miracle he survived, and after he had years of rehabilitation and multiple operations on his arms, his legs and his eyes. But as a kid, I never saw him as incapacitated in any way. He did everything: he was an avid golfer, a talented furniture maker and he and mum were gold medalists in ballroom dancing.



Olive and I took a tour of the rehab centre at City Hospital and we saw the same spirit: people trying tenaciously to get back to where they have been, with the help and support of excellent medical staff. Especially after the Humboldt Broncos bus crash, supporting rehab at City Hospital felt right to us. Anything we can give to help people regain independence, we are proud to do.

We've realized that there comes a point in everyone's life where you have to decide what's going to happen with your estate when you are gone. You have to consider what really matters to you. What strikes a chord with you? What mattered in your life and in your family? Olive and I have guiding values from our work as teachers: humanity, compassion and justice. And all of those values come to life through our giving to City Hospital.

I spent exactly 32.68 years teaching, mostly grade 1 and 2, including working with primary schools in Botswana and teachers in Grenada. But the most wonderful experience I've ever had was the care I received at City Hospital after I fell and cracked my pelvis. From the moment I arrived, I felt that everyone's goal was to get

me better. I felt so much encouragement and love. I was never criticized. I never saw a frown.

One morning, after I'd been walking a bit, but not far, it was time for breakfast. One of the nurses wanted me to walk by myself to the dining room, which was further than I had been able to go. It was the best breakfast of my life—so wonderful and rewarding!

I have City Hospital in my Will because it means that much to me. It feels good to know they'll have a little more money to be able to continue their good work.


